Betty Scott passed peacefully on Wednesday, May 21, 2025 at Cameron Healthcare Center, Cameron, WV.

She was born January 21, 1945 on Maxwell Field Army Air Corps Base, Montgomery, AL, the daughter of the late Earl and Lois Parham Young. Betty graduated Cameron High School Class of 1963; was a graduate of Fairmont College; and was the first elected woman Mayor of Cameron, having served 10 years, before retiring. Then in 2016, she was approved by council to serve as Mayor again; and served an additional 2 years in 2018; she was an avid reader, crocheter, and loved jigsaw puzzles.

July 5, 1991 Betty married the love of her life, Gene Scott, who died May 8, 2017.

In addition to her parents, and husband, she was preceded in death by a great-granddaughter, Carson Belle.

Survivors include her daughters, Melissa (Ken) Cunningham of Moundsville and Michelle (Robbie) Zarobinski of Hagerstown, MD; grandson, Christopher Chambers of Wheeling, WV and great-granddaughter, Rosaleigh Chambers of Wheeling.

Extended family includes Debbie (John) Cumpston of Cameron, Cathy (Mike) Brewer of Rices Landing, PA, and Lori (Brian) Marling of Cameron; six grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.

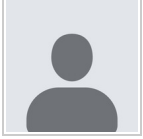
