Rudolf Keller, age 85, formerly of Murrysville, PA resided at the Welty Home of Wheeling WV, died Friday, December 28, 2018 in Peterson Rehabilitation Hospital, Wheeling, WV.

He was born December 27, 1933 in Winterthur, Switzerland, the son of the late Heinrich and Elsa Kron Keller.

He served with the Swiss Army; was an Electro-Chemist and the owner of EMEC/Electrostrip, a Swiss Protestant; an avid stamp collector and tennis player and a member of several Chemical Societies.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife, Elisabeth Keller in 2018; a brother; and two sisters.
